Marcus Caelius Rufus – the Image of a Republican Politician in a Popular Literature

(Summary)

The article is an example of a scientific reflection on the historical crime novels of Steven Saylor. The research is concentrated on a historical figure od Marcus Caelisu Rufus, whose appearance we can find in many novels of an American author. Despite the fictional plot and main character – detective Gordianus – many elements in the books is true according to historical facts.
